Parent Handbook

Administrative Paperwork

Annual Motor Vehicle Checklist

All adults, both registered leaders and parents who attend campouts or provide transportation services are required to provide insurance and other information to our Outdoor Coordinator by completing the **Annual Motor Vehicle Checklist**. This is critical information that we must have. All of the information is kept confidential by Joe Baumgarten. We are required to maintain this as per guidelines outlined in the *Guide to Safe Scouting*. Please complete and bring to the first Troop meeting and provide updates as needed during the year. This is an ANNUAL Requirement by the BSA. A copy is provided to you tonight in this packet.

Medical Records

Troop 42 requires medical forms A, B and C, the troop over the counter form and a copy of both sides of the scout's health insurance card. Annual medical forms are NOT just a requirement for those going to Summer Camp; they are REQUIRED of ALL Scouts and Scouters so that we have updated medical/insurance information. The BSA requires an ANNUAL update and the form is good for 12 months from the date signed. Our Medical Records Coordinator is Lisa Motto. It is CRITICAL that these forms be kept current and for any parents who are just occasional campers, we should at least have the basic information submitted. See Lisa or drop her a note at (medicalrecords@nftroop42.org) to check when current forms for you or your son will expire. These forms must be kept current and are NOT optional. Scouts and Scouters without current medical forms cannot be allowed to participate in any outdoor activities.

Monthly Permission Slips

Permissions slips are a requirement for both Insurance purposes as well as helping us keep track of the Scouts planning to attend the campouts. The information is also used to develop the monthly driving assignments; hence we also need to know which adults are attending. It is always easy to adjust down but if we plan for 20 scouts to attend and 30 scouts show up, we end up in a bind for several reasons. Some include insurance, drivers, equipment, and food to name a few. Please take a good close look at the camping dates. Permission slips are available online and should be turned in prior to the campout. Check calendar for submittal deadline.





Program Calendar

The Troop Calendar is online at the Troop Website with permission slips and directions to each of our locations. The calendar is drafted in February of the prior Scouting year so that between then and the beginning of the next Scouting year, the leadership teams can fine tune and make any adjustments. By providing this to you in advance, our hope is that you will put these dates on your family calendar so that everyone can do their best to attend and parents are aware of when we may need help with driving to and/or from the campsites.

Please remember that we encourage Scouts to take part in other activities and we understand that conflicts will come up. Another reason we stress the importance of the calendar being reviewed is so that the Scout can look at the trips where he may need to leave early or arrive late. Sometimes, they may have to miss the day program and come for dinner and the night program; sometimes it could be the other way around. We simply encourage each scout to do what they can to maximize their participation and advancement opportunities and enjoy Scouting.
